Greetings, as the new Sacramento Chapter President I hope this message finds you safe and well. In a small ceremony in a La Bou Restaurant parking lot Del Hanson passed the gavel to me and I was both humbled and proud to receive this assignment from our past president – Del Hanson. It goes without saying that 2020 was a tumultuous year for the Sacramento Chapter. We needed a very special person to lead us through the "troubled waters" and Del was the right man for the job. I am forever grateful to Del for his friendship and the

example that he has set for us all.

I originally met Del three years ago when I volunteered to serve as co-chairman for our local law enforcement/first responders awards program. In our first year serving together we were privileged to honor a Sacramento County Sheriff's Deputy by the name of Adam Gibson. On March 16, 2018 he aided in the rescue of a man who threatened to jump off Elk Grove's pedestrian bridge over Highway 99. The pedestrian had scaled the tall protective fence that lines the bridge with the intent of taking his life.

Gibson happened to be driving on northbound Highway 99 when he saw the man and immediately alerted the Elk Grove police. The deputy reportedly saw a nearby tour bus that was stopped in traffic and he persuaded the driver to park under the bridge so that its roof could break the man's fall. Gibson then climbed on top of the bus and contacted the man who dangled from the bridge.

An Elk Grove police negotiator later arrived and convinced the man to climb back up the bridge's fence. However, he lost his grip and Gibson was able to catch him as he fell on to the bus. Ironically my daughter and I were eyewitnesses to the whole scene.

Unfortunately Officer Adam Gibson lost his life in the line of duty this past January 18, 2021 in a gun fight near Cal Expo. His K-9 partner, Riley, also lost his life attempting to protect his partner. Adam Gibson was a six year law enforcement veteran who also served as a U.S. Marine in Afghanistan. Deputy Gibson also earned a Bronze Star for Bravery and a Major Incident Ribbon. Please keep his wife and new born child in your thoughts and prayers.

Our next ZOOM meeting is scheduled for Monday, February 15<sup>th</sup> at 6:30pm the day AFTER Valentine's Day. How many of you know that when a holiday's primary color is "pink" it is NOT about you (LOL). Our guest speaker will be Charlie Frye from the Riverside SAR Chapter. <u>Alan Brown Brooking</u> (87) died peacefully at home on December 1, 2020, after a three-year battle with throat cancer.

Alan joined the SAR in 2012 and immediately became active at the chapter, state, and national levels. He was a member of both the Sacramento and Gold Country chapters. He served the Sacramento Chapter as member of the Color Guard, Telephone Committee, Greeter and Cashier, and as President of the Sacramento Chapter in 2017.

Alan and his wife Susan, a DAR member, never missed an SAR or DAR meeting when they were in town. The Gold Trail Chapter DAR was also a beneficiary of his many kindnesses— if DAR chapters had mascots, Alan was Gold Trail's.

Alan was a native of Oklahoma City, born November 29, 1933, to Ludie (Pickett) and Levi Henry Brooking. He attended Oklahoma City University.

Alan was proud of his service in the U.S. Navy, particularly his Mediterranean Cruises aboard the USS Intrepid. His flight operations photos and cameras are part of the Intrepid, Sea, Air & Space Museum Complex in New York City.

He was a successful small business owner providing window coverings for most Silicon Valley tech companies, hospitals and schools. Alan met Steve Jobs when Apple Computer was just one small building in Cupertino. Apple and Alan's company continued their relationship through construction of the Infinite Loop Campus.

Alan's personal interests were varied: he created stunning stained-glass windows; crewed on Porsche race teams at Le Mans, Daytona, and Sebring; autocross'd his own Porsches and prepared them for show in club concours events. During the 1970's, Alan became an avid antique fountain pen collector and traveled to international pen shows throughout the US.

Those who knew Alan, know he welcomed an opportunity to share interesting conversation and a wee dram of good Scotch Whiskey.
