June 2015 marks the 240th anniversary of the first major military engagement of the Revolutionary War, the Battle of Bunker Hill. The action actually took place on near by Breed's Hill on June 17, 1775 where the colonist held off seasoned British troops for more than two hours before being forced to abandon their position. The colonists inflicted terrible casualties attacking British

Soldiers. Of the estimated 2200 attacking British, more than 1000 were killed or wounded. The following month George Washington assumed command of the continental forces, and in March the following year, the British withdrew their forces from Boston.

President Craig Anderson called the meeting to order at 7:01 PM and gave the invocation. Tal Norwood led the Pledge of Allegiance and Evan Jonas led the membership in the Pledge to the SAR.

Past President Tom Chilton presented a historical overview of the Bennington and Philadelphia Light Horse flags, assisted by guests Jackson Reid and Ryan Yi

President Anderson presented Alan Brooking his supplemental Ancestor Certificate and Evan Jonas the Lamp Lighter Award.

President Anderson asked Alan Brooking and new member Philip Kerr to come forward. Alan Brooking introduced Philip Kerr and read his biography. President Anderson administered the SAR oath and presented him with his membership certificate. Alan Brooking pinned the SAR Rosette on him. All members were invited to come forward to offer the customary welcoming handshake to our new member.

President Anderson asked Tom Chilton to talk about the Poster Contest winner. Tom asked Ryan Yi to come forward as he explained the Chapter has been involved with the Poster Contest for 4-5 years. This year we had 350 posters from 16 classes and one, Ryan Yi's poster, was voted best in state. Ryan received \$45 in coin, a \$50 check from the Sacramento Chapter and a \$300 check from CASSAR.

Past President Don Littlefield presented a check, from Intel Foundation, in the amount of \$5,715 to the Sacramento Chapter of SAR. Last year Intel Foundation gave out over \$8,400,000 to service organizations across the country. President Anderson thanked Don Littlefield for the check and his support of our Chapter. He pointed out that this represents over 570 hours of volunteer work by Don and his volunteer work over the years has brought over \$41,000 to our Chapter.

President Anderson announced that during the CASSAR spring meeting, the Sacramento Chapter Color Guard was awarded a flag streamer for their participation in the 2014 Wreaths Across America program. The Sacramento Chapter was also awarded a certificate for Outstanding Achievement in the Best Chapter Contest which is an annual award based on performance in eight categories: Meetings and Attendance, Publicity, New Members, Medals and Certificates Awarded, Chapter Activities, Community Service, CASSAR Programs, and Publications. The Sacramento Chapter has scored very high year after year because of the dedication and hard work of our members especially in the areas of meetings, acquiring new members, Chapter activities (color guard/ school guard), and CASSAR youth programs. Color Guard Commander Russ Kaiser was asked to come forward and accept the Streamer. Color Guard Commander Kaiser shared with the audience all the work that went into the Poster Contest from finding schools, meeting with teachers, talking to the classes about the theme, providing paper, picking up the finished posters, sorting them into categories, displaying them at the monthly meeting for the Chapter to vote on, then taking everything down and providing certificates to the students who participated. He thanked Tom Chilton for all the work he has put into the program and asked for a well deserved round of applause. He went on to talk about the School Guard program and how they performed at 15 schools this year. He thanked the members, Jim Faulkinbury, Tom Chilton, Ernie Garcia, Alan Brooking and DAR member Helena Hurst, and said the School Guard is looking for additional members to help out for next year.

May 15 Minutes Continued

President Anderson thanked and acknowledged the outstanding work of the Chapter members who participated in the living history presentations put on at our local schools. Our presenters gave these young students close up, hands on experience of our country's early days and a sense of the sacrifices that our ancestors made for their freedoms. He thanked Color Guard Commander Russ Kaiser, DAR member Helena Hurst, Color Guard members Jim Faulkinbury, Tom Chilton, Ernie Garcia, and Alan Brooking for their hard work. He pointed out the Color Guard needs help and if you are interested please see Russ Kaiser.

President Anderson called on Russ Kaiser who shared that that the Color Guard presented the colors for the California Federation of Republican Women at their Spring Convention on April 20th and received a \$50 donation which he presented to President Anderson.

President Anderson shared information about our youth programs:

- Our 2013 JROTC winner, Cameron Hoover, went on to win the National award. He has notified us that he will be attending the US Air Force Academy this fall. He thanked past-chairman Tom Chilton and current chairman Roy Adkins for their hard work in making this program a success. He shared correspondence he received from Richard J. Buesgen, Lt Col, USAF (Ret) SASI, Hiram Johnson High School,
 - "Mr. Roy Adkins did an outstanding job of representing your chapter at our recent awards ceremony. Not only did he present your award with professionalism, he provided us with a multitude of pictures of the event for our archives. He also remained afterward to interact with our cadets and other guests. Thank you for sending a sincere, professional representative to our event. We look forward to his participation in next year's award ceremony. "
- Our 2014 Knight Essay winner, Cameron Remington thanked us for his award and let us know that he has been accepted to UC Berkeley

Jordan Hull was accepted to Texas A&M NROTC program.

Past President and Color Guard Commander Russ Kaiser shared with the audience that he has been working with CASSAR on firing muskets at different events and the need for insurance. He is developing a Chapter Safety and Training Procedure in conjunction with CASSAR. Those interested in going through this training should contact Russ Kaiser.

Chairman of Activities Ernie Garcia shared that on June 27th it will have been 237 years since the Presidio of San Francisco was founded. There will be a celebration that will feature a Spanish Color Guard and the San Francisco SAR Chapter President will speak. This is a program some of you may wish to attend.

Dinner was served

After dinner President Anderson introduced our guest speaker. Major General William Wade's military service began in 1970 when he enlisted into the California Army National Guard as a private. After serving as a personnel specialist and unit clerk, he attended the California Military Academy and was commissioned a second lieutenant in 1973. During forty-one years of continuous service, he served in various positions of increasing responsibility at company, battalion, brigade, and division level. He was selected by Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger as the 44th Adjutant General of the California National Guard. Through four decades of military service he has worked diligently to ensure that National Guard Soldiers, Airmen and other units were prepared to provide the manpower necessary to participate in joint military operations in a seamless environment overseas and in the United States. He retired in 2011 following NATO service as the Deputy Chief of Staff, Operations, Joint Force Command, Naples, Italy. He asked the audience to welcome MAJOR GENERAL WILLIAM H. WADE II.

General Wade gave a history of the militia and how it started in ancient Greece. In 1181 English King Henry II made it an obligation of every adult male to arm and equip himself to defend the realm. Later the wealthy were required to arm the poor and provide a leader to train the men. When the first settlements in America occurred colonists were required to organize and defend themselves. Captain Miles Standish was elected as the first military commander. He started one of the first musters to demonstrate the exercise of arms. As more towns were settled each organized its own militia. As the colonies organized, this was the beginning of the National Guard in America. Over the years the National Guard grew and became more military like until all 13 colonies were represented. In 1775 when the First Continental Army was established the militia or National Guard became America's Army. It was best summed up by General John Logan who said, "A *way off in the wilds of America, a soldier had been found totally different from any that had ever walked a battlefield. Upon one day, he was a citizen, quietly following the plow; upon the next he became a soldier, knowing no fear and carrying a whole destroying battery in his trusted rifle. He was a soldier – from conviction to principle, from loyalty to his country and from duty to his family." From the American Revolution to the War of 1812, the Civil War, WWI, WWII, Korea, Vietnam, Gulf War and now the Global War on Terrorism the National Guard has been there.*

Patriot Biographies

Below is one of the patriot biographies submitted to the national organization as part of their program to collect these articles from members as a resource for prospective members researching their family histories. These biographies may also be submitted for publication here in the Courier as described below.

Patriot George Anderson Sr. P - 103468 Submitted by Don Spradling, Member #151154 Sacramento Chapter; California

George Anderson Sr. was born about 1757 and died in 1837. He was a farmer in Edgecomb County, North Carolina when he enlisted as a private in Capt. Quinn's Company of the 10th Regiment. He was discharged after nine months in December 1779 according to muster rolls of the Continental Line of North Carolina. In early 1781 he was drafted into service again and served in the Company commanded by Captains Ethel, Philips and Amos Swint which was attached to the regiment of Col. Sinton and was organized at Halifax, North Carolina. This regiment was engaged in the Battle of Guilford Courthouse which was fought on March 15, 1781. After this battle he returned to Halifax but soon afterward he was returned to the Continental Line in which he served for the next twelve months under the direction of Captain Alex Pursard, whose Company belonged to the regiment of Col. Pinketham Eaton. This regiment was organized at Ramseys Mills, near Guilford Courthouse, North Carolina and moved south of the Santee River in South Carolina and then on to the area around Augusta, Georgia. The British and their Loyalist allies were defeated there, but Col. Eaton was killed during the battle.

From there they moved on to Savannah to effect exchange of prisoners and then on to Fort Ninety Six where he was put under the command of General Nathaniel Greene. He was with this command until he was returned to Ramseys Mills where he was discharged after 14 months of service.

Sometime before 1794 he was married to his wife, Jane. Sometime prior to the year 1837 they moved from North Carolina to Henderson County, Tennessee. They had six children; George Anderson, John Anderson, Nancy (Anderson) Stalions, Rebecca Anderson, Sally (Anderson) Taylor and Polly (Anderson) Lee. They were all living at the time of the supplemental pension application for George Anderson Sr. in 1853, which was made by his son, George Anderson Jr.

Instructions for Submitting Patriot Biographies

Patriot biographies, such as the one above, are being solicited by the national organization. The purpose is to publish them online and so make it easier for potential SAR applicants to find the information they need in order to find potential ancestors and to complete their applications. The biographies should be about 500 words and should be submitted in Microsoft Word format to patriotbios@sar.org as an email attachment. When you submit your entry, please include your name, Chapter and SAR Member number. If you have a patriot number assigned, include it with your submission. If not, one will be assigned. It would be appreciated if a copy could also be sent to neilel@aol.com or to craig@winfirst.com so that the bios could also be presented in future Courier editions.
