The Sacramento Chapter winning poster will then go to the California Society Annual meeting in Concord on April 20-21 and compete for state prizes.

The School Guard is gearing up for their series of Elementary School Living History presentations. It's not too late to participate, even as an interested spectator. And, we are always looking for additional members to join the Sacramento Chapter Color Guard. It is a great way to show your patriotism to the community. Contact Russ Kaiser (boat361@aol.com) if you are interested in participating in either group.

Let's talk about Sacramento Chapter finances. First, let me state that the Sacramento Chapter is in good financial shape for the next few years. The Intel Foundation Grants have had a huge impact in helping the Sacramento Chapter establish a strong financial base. Next year should be no different. Having said that, our chapter dues and donations (excluding the Intel grants) fall about \$3,400 or about \$19/member below our annual operating expenses. That's before we add in the \$800 cost of Liability Insurance. As recent as 2012, our Chapter dues were \$15/member, however, when the California Society raised their dues to \$20/member, we chose to absorb the increase and reduced our chapter dues to \$10/member to keep your combined Annual Dues to \$60. Shortly thereafter, the National Society raised their dues to \$35, bringing your combined annual member dues to \$65 and where it has stayed for the last several years. Going forward, this means one of two things: Either we increase Sacramento annual chapter dues by some amount or we cut our youth awards

programs and operating expenses. Your elected officers will be wrestling with these financial realities and over the coming months will be addressing our short and long-term finances. The one thing this chapter does not have, unlike most other organizations, is an annual fundraising event. Until we can develop a viable annual fundraiser, we must consider raising our chapter dues. Like I said at the start, for the time being, the Sacramento Chapter is in good financial shape and as long as the Intel grants continue, we should be good for a couple of years. We will continue to keep you fully appraised of our options and our decisions. In the meantime, we welcome your feedback, involvement, and suggestions on ways we can remain viable and serve the community. But one thing is for certain and that is we need you! Get involved in your chapter. Libertas et patria.



Stories from the Revolution (The Battle of Guilford Courthouse)




This week marks 237 years since The Battle of Guilford Courthouse was fought on March 15, 1781. That was just short of 6 years after the Battles of Lexington and Concord. In the weeks preceding the battle the British General, Cornwallis, had pursued Nathaneal Greene's army across North Carolina and southern Virginia. When they finally met on the battlefield there were about 2,100 British soldiers up against about 4,500 Patriots. The battle lasted only about 90 minutes. The Patriot's General Greene retreated from the battlefield, technically giving the British the victory, but about 25 percent of Cornwallis's men were killed, wounded or captured during the battle. One

British statesman, Charles James Fox (1749-1806), said of this result: "Another such victory would ruin the British armv."

Cornwallis retreated to Wilmington, NC on the coast where he made the controversial decision to retreat into Virginia and where ultimately he would end up trapped by American and French troops at Yorktown, with the French Navy preventing any reinforcements coming from General Clinton in New York.
