WASHINGTON AT VALLEY FORGE FEBRUARY 16, 1778

WELCOME NEW MEMBERS

Mark John Mozdy (left) was born in Meadville, PA and grew up in Erie, PA. He attended Erie Catholic and public schools. He graduated from Strong Vincent high school in 1974 and Edinboro State College in 1978 with a degree in Computer Technology. Moved to San Jose, CA in 1979 and worked for Lockheed Missiles and Space Company from 1979 to 1986.

He moved to Sacramento in 1986 where he met his wife Wanda. They have one daughter, Jenna. He has worked for Computer Sciences Corporation Defense Systems division, MCI, and Verizon. He retired in 2016. He enjoys playing golf, genealogy, travel, reading and spending time with family and friends. He is a member of Our Lady of Assumption Catholic Church.



His application for membership in the Sons of the American Revolution was approved on May 15, 2019. His Patriot ancestor was John Hart, a member of the Committee of Safety, Vice President of Provincial Congress, and signer of the Declaration of Independence.

Charles Karlsson (Center) is a retired railroad engineer and a 5th generation Sacramento native. He currently lives in Lodi, CA. His application was approved on July 26th 2019; his patriot ancestor was Julius Beach, a private in Capt. Woods Company, 2nd Regiment commanded by Col Herman Swift.

Jimmy Stephenson (Right) was born in Vallejo, CA and grew up in Waco, Texas, and Woodland, CA. He graduated from Pioneer High School, and enlisted in the USAF. He recently transferred to active reserve status as a staff Sgt at Travis AFB, and he currently lives with his wife, Tiffany, in Newman, CA. Jimmy's application was approved on Feb 26, 2015 but was deployed in the middle east at the time his application was approved; his patriot ancestor is Patrick Anderson, a Captain in the Pennsylvania Musketry Battalion and the Pennsylvania State Regiment.

August 17th Meeting Minutes

President Gunter called the meeting to order at 10AM and gave the invocation. Roy Adkins led the Pledge of Allegiance and President Gunter led the pledge to the SAR.

New members Mark Mozdy, Charles Karlsson along with Jimmy Stephenson were called forward. They were introduced by NSSAR Genealogist General Jim Faulkinbury and Secretary Craig Anderson. President Gunther administered the oath of induction, and presented them with their member certificates, Rosettes, and name-tags.

Chapter members were invited to come forward and congratulate the new members.

President Gunter presented Certificates of Patriotism for military service to Roy Adkins and Craig Anderson. CASSAR VP Craig Anderson presented Certificates of Patriotism for war service to Wesley Anderson (two certificates) and Jimmy Stephenson (two certificates). He also presented SAR War Service Medals, and Oak Leaf Clusters to both compatriots.



Craig Anderson gave the Chapter Secretary's report listing an increase on 14 members and a loss of two members, year to date. He gave an overview on the awards being held by the Chapter Secretary, JROTC Chairman, and Chapter President. SAR-Sacramento pins would be brought to the monthly meetings and distributed to our members and others. Youth protection training records were reviewed and it was stressed that all members who interact with young people through school programs, presentations or participating in color guard events must have this training. Members were asked to forward updated certificates to the Chapter Secretary. It was reported that the cost of the Courier mailings far exceed the cost recovered from members. The membership voted to increase the cost to the membership to \$25.00 per year for 10 issues to cover actual printing and postage costs. The veterans recognition program was reviewed and veteran members were encouraged to submit their DD214's so they could receive this recognition. It was announced that member dues will be mailed out on October 1st and are due on or before Nov 1st.

Treasurer Don Littlefield undated the membership on the chapter accounts, the 2019 YTD expenses and 2019 projected budget.

The Chapter Registrar updated the membership on new member applications.

2020 officer nominations were discussed. The immediate need is for a new Chapter Secretary, Craig Anderson will be stepping down from this position in January 2020. Chapter program chairman needs are for the Americanism Poster Contest, Brochure Contest. Knight Essay Contest.

President Gunter reviewed and discussed Carl Ahlberg's report on the chapter color guard. Since there were some questions arising from the report, further discussion would be delayed until the School Guard Coordinator could be present to clarify the report.

Don Littlefield showed samples of a challenge coin that he is designing for the Sacramento Chapter. Some suggestions were made and there will be more information about this forthcoming in the future

Don Littlefield also gave an update on the 2020 spring meeting that the chapter will host. The hotel is booked and he is currently working on dinner locations for the Thursday and Friday dinners.

Terrence Conklin led the recessional and Scott Brooks led the benediction

The meeting was adjourned at 12:15PM.

George S. & Stella M. Knight Essay Contest

Each year, the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) invites all high school students (9th through 12th grades) interested in the American Revolution to participate in the George S. & Stella M. Knight Essay Contest. The contest is open to all US Citizen and Legal Resident students attending home schools, public, parochial, or private high schools in that same grade range. The National Association of Secondary School Principals has placed this program on the 2017-18 NASSP List of Approved Contests, Programs, and Activities for Students.

To participate, students must submit an original 800 to 1,200-word essay based on an event, person, philosophy or ideal associated with the American Revolution, Declaration of Independence, or the framing of the United States Constitution. Each student's essay is judged based upon its historical accuracy, clarity, organization, grammar and spelling, and documentation.

Our youth programs such as the Knight Essay Contest have a profound influence on our young students allowing them to discover new perspectives and broaden their understanding of our American heritage. We want to share with you, a thank you note from our 2019 chapter winner of this contest, Ms. Anna Guzman:

VETERANS RECOGNITION



Wesley Anderson, two Special Ops Certificates of Patriotism for Operations Praying Mantis and Eldorado Canyon.

Jimmy Stephenson, two Southwest Asia Certificates of Patriotism for Operations Enduring Freedom and Inherent Resolve.







Honoring Our Patriot Ancestors

Hezekiah Davies

Hezekiah Davies was born on November 22, 1747 in Charlestown Twp., Chester County, Pennsylvania. He grew up on the family farm and was trained as a saddle maker in his youth.

In January 1776, he enlisted in the 5th Pennsylvania Regiment, a Chester County Militia unit. Later that year, when General Washington issued a call for troops to help in the defense of New York, a call went out for PA troops to serve in the Flying Camp. Hezekiah volunteered to serve and was assigned to Col William Montgomery's Chester County Battalion. This unit marched through Philadelphia on July 18th and 19th and was the first Pennsylvania unit to arrive in Perth Amboy on July 24th. At Perth Amboy the regiment was re-organized and sent north to Fort Lee on the west bank of the Hudson River. On September 7th, Hezekiah Davies received a commission as a 1st Lt. in Samuel Culberson's company. The Flying Camp remained in garrison at Fort Lee until November 1776. Following the battle of White Plains, General Howe moved his troops south to eliminate the last American presence on Manhattan at Fort Washington on the east bank of the Hudson River opposite Fort Lee.

To counter this threat, troops were ordered across the river from Ft Lee to reinforce Fort Washington. On November 16th 1776, 8000 British and Hessian Troops attacked the 3000 troops stationed in Fort Washington. The action lasted from early morning to late afternoon, and the American troops were ultimately driven back into the fort. Outnumbered and seeing the hopelessness of their situation, the American Commander, Col Magaw, surrendered the garrison. The troops were severely abused by their Hessian captors, stripped of their personal possessions including much of their clothing, and marched south toward New York City.

Lt. Hezekiah Davies was confined for a time in New York with the other officers, and then in December 1776 he was sent aboard one of the prison ships anchored in the harbor. On January 20th, 1777, he was allowed to give his parole, and he was sent to Long Island where he was quartered with the prominent Dutch family of Nicolas Schenck. During his lengthy period of confinement on Long Island, he received periodic sums of money from various Pennsylvania benefactors for the upkeep of himself and other prisoners. While a prisoner, he also compiled and maintained a roster of the other American prisoners being held on Long Island. Hezekiah was exchanged in December 1780. He applied for and was granted a pension in 1833 of \$320 per year for his service. He died in 1837 at the age of 90 years.

Hezekiah Davies is the patriot ancestor of Craig Anderson, Wesley Anderson, Jimmy Stephenson, and Dark Alvarado.



OUR COLOR GUARD

We want to recognize the contributions of our compatriots who volunteer their time and resources to serve on our chapter color guard. They are the public face of our chapter, and we have had many members over the years contribute their time and energy to this group. Color Guard members provide their own uniforms, equipment, and transportation for these events.

The Sacramento Color Guard is invited to participate in many patriotic events in the Sacramento Area throughout the year such as Memorial Day, Independence Day, Veterans Day, and Wreaths Across America, we are asked frequently to post our Nation's Colors at DAR events.

Color Guard Commander David Beach

We were asked recently to present the National Colors at a commercial event at the Sacramento Convention Center. Color Guard members,

Russ Kaiser, Don Littlefield, Ernie Garcia, Carl Ahlberg, and Craig Anderson spent part of a day prior to the event practicing so that during the event they would put on a professional appearance for the audience. Their appearance was very sharp! The event sponsor, Servpro, donated \$500 to our Chapter for our youth programs.

Color Guard members have the ability to earn SAR awards for their service. A Color Guardsman must personally keep track of the events in which he has participated, and must prove that he has participated in the minimum number of events to the Chapter Color Guard Commander who then reports them to the State President or State Color Guard Commander.

<u>Bronze Color Guard Medal</u> To earn the SAR Bronze Color Guard Medal, a Color Guardsman must participate in at least 50% of the scheduled Chapter and/or State Color Guard activities or 50% of scheduled School Guard activities in each of three years, which do not need to be continuous. A year shall be any period of twelve consecutive months.

Silver Color Guard medal: CASSAR uses the events system for awarding the Silver Color Guard Medal. To earn an SAR Silver Color Guard Medal, a Color Guardsman must participate in at least three District and/or National events in each of three years, which do not need to be continuous. A year shall be any period of twelve consecutive months. The qualifying events must be documented by the Color Guardsman and submitted on the prescribed form via the chapter Color Guard commander to the State Color Guard Commander for approval. Qualifying events for the Silver medal are listed on page 4 in the current issue of the SAR Colorguardsman: https://members.sar.org/media/uploads/pages/245/ORGEok24AV3Q.pdf

Some typical Silver Medal qualifying events for members of our chapter include: CASSAR meetings when the President General is present; Memorial Day; Independence Day; Veterans Day, and Wreaths Across America.

<u>National Von Steuben Medal:</u> To earn the National Von Steuben Medal for Sustained Achievement in the NSSAR Color Guard, a Color Guardsman must serve at least five (5) years after the date his application for the Silver Color Guard Medal was approved and he must participate in at least twenty-five (25) National and/or District Color Guard events. Chapter members who currently hold the Von Steuben Medal are **Tom Chilton, Jim Faulkinbury, Ernie Garcia, and Ron Proffer.**

<u>Gold Color Guard Medal:</u> The Gold Color Guard Medal may be awarded for SAR Color Guard service at the National Level. The National Color Guard Committee will be the final judge of who is qualified to be awarded the Gold Color Guard Medal.

If you want to become a member of our Chapter's Color Guard, contact David Beach (jdbeachjd@msn.com) David can also give you advice on building a uniform.
